

Be Savvy and Safe in 2026!

Beginning a new year is a good time to begin thinking about some new ways to protect yourself. A woman recently came into my office with her donation check and said she might as well bring it in as mail it. She showed me the letter from *The Seniors Center*. It looked legitimate, and told of the "desperate need" for funds, asking her to "rush your emergency \$35 donation." She thought it would help *her* senior center, *Shipley Center*. But no, donations to *The Seniors Center, in Washington DC*, do not help any local senior centers!

You should have received a legitimate fundraising letter from me in December with a green return address on the envelope, a green reply card, and a blue insert with suggestions for various giving ideas. If you have not had a chance to respond to the December letter, please do so, whenever you are able to, any time this year

Other scams going around are calls or emails that you have "inherited" a large amount of money, but have to send thousands of dollars to pay "attorney fees" or "customs fees" to get the crate of money to your house from afar. Do not fall for this!

WATCH OUT FOR SCAMS!

An article from the *National Council on Aging* lists other scams to be aware of. They sound pretty scary and can cost a LOT of money if we fall for them.

Some ways to protect yourself:

- Don't give personal information over the phone to anyone who calls you posing as a Medicare representative. If you provide enough information, they can submit false claims to Medicare and get paid thousands of dollars.
- Don't buy prescription drugs over the internet, as fake or even harmful substances have been sent to consumers.
- Don't agree to pay debts of a deceased family member without consulting an attorney. You may not be required to pay them, or they may not be legitimate debts at all, created just to scam you at a vulnerable time in your life.
- Don't ever send money or give your credit card info out online or over the phone to claim an inheritance, sweepstakes, lottery prize, or any other funds they say are coming your way. If you are a legitimate winner or heir, you will not have to pay anything.
- Donate only to groups or charities you know and trust.
- If you are uncertain about the legitimacy of a charitable organization, call your local Better Business Bureau or your local Chamber of Commerce
- If someone calls you claiming to be a grandchild in trouble in a foreign country, needing money wired or paid by credit card to rescue them, it is a scam 99.99% of the time. If you are worried, get the return phone number and then call your children or grandchildren's regular phone number you have on file and check up on them. They are most likely doing just fine, and will enjoy an unexpected call from you!
- Beware of phone calls supposedly from "the IRS" threatening you with being arrested for back taxes, or from "the Sheriff's office" for not coming in for jury duty or paying for traffic or parking tickets. A representative will offer to help you pay the penalties, or "settle this matter" via credit card. Hang up!

One way that *Shipley Center* has helped in the past is by posting "Fraud Alerts" on our Facebook page. Let us know if someone has tried to scam or deceive you, and we can publish the information to help others. *Like* our Facebook page to make sure you get our "Fraud Alerts," and tell your friends to *like* us also at facebook.com/ShipleyCenter.

Finally, before spending money or giving out personal info, "Call a Friend." It can be any other adult, relative or friend, adult grandchild or church friend, and run the situation by them and see if they agree it is "legit" before sending any funds or giving out any information!

Here's to a Happy New Year of smart, savvy financial decisions!

Spotlight on Diana and Gary Smith & The Albert Haller Foundation

We welcome the new year with a rather different kind of article, this month featuring two long-time Sequim residents and their relationship with the Albert Haller family, and later, the Foundation.

For this interview, I spent almost two hours at Diana and Gary's beautiful 86-year-old home up Taylor Cutoff Road. This was a home Albert Haller built in 1940, and lived in until 1992, when the Smiths bought it. They have obviously brought amenities up to date, but the interior still retains its historic charm. A trout pond, surrounded by trees, is the view from the back verandah.



Diana Smith was born in Oroville, CA, the youngest of five. The family moved to Paradise, CA—yes, that Paradise decimated in the 2018 Camp fire—then, to the Seattle area, where she graduated from Kent-Meridian High School.

An interesting note during their time in Paradise was that, in 1962, Diana won the Miss Golden Nugget crown for the annual Golden Nugget Days (the third year for that event). For several years after that, she returned to be part of the parade, on a float with past queens. The last time, 2014, she wore an elegant Victorian gown she had designed and sewn herself. Later, she was a Marilyn Monroe impersonator for the "Let Me Entertain You" show during Sequim's Irrigation Festival!

Diana is an accomplished seamstress! Half the basement of their home is her sewing room! She began simply, creating placemats, napkins, and basket liners. Then, a friend asked her if she'd be interested in sewing outfits for American Girl dolls. YES! And now, Diana has been sewing and selling her wares at the Tacoma Home and Gift Show for thirty years! She loves having once-little-girls who bought clothes for their dolls, now grown-up, bringing *their* little girls to buy clothes for their beloved American Girl dolls. After this year's show, Diana will retire and then sell only online.

Both she and her husband are avid bridge players, and Diana has headed up the Saturday night Bridge group at Shipley Center for the past ten years.

Gary Smith, born in Stony Point, NY, was raised in Rockland County, thirty miles north of New York City. After graduating from Clarkstown Jr/Sr High School at age 17, Gary enlisted in the US Navy. After boot camp at Great Lakes (Chicago area), it was off to Pensacola, FL, to Communications Tech and Radio Direction-Finding Schools. Stationed in Guam for two years, Gary became very proficient at free diving and spear fishing; also tracking Russian submarines, with top-secret crypto clearance.

From Guam, Gary was shipped to a Direction-Finding base on the Lummi Indian Reservation, north of Bellingham, WA. On days off, he and a fellow Naval buddy would travel to Seattle. There, his buddy introduced Gary to a girl he had previously dated, Diana Shannon. After a whirlwind courtship, they were married. With a twinkle in her eye, Diana says, "I graduated in June, met Gary in August, and we were married in January!" With a gleam in his eye, Gary drolly states, "I guess we hit it off, as we celebrate 62 years of marriage this month!"

Together as a Family! Two years and two children—Darren and Shonda—later, Gary was discharged from the Navy and the family moved back to his NY hometown. Gary worked three jobs, just to make ends meet, when a former classmate, a Clarkstown Police officer, told him the town was looking to hire ten more officers and he should take the test.

Gary took the Civil Service test, the first person ever to ace it with 100%! Obviously hired, he was involved in many capacities: SWAT and SCUBA teams, Police Academy Defensive Tactical Instructor, and a helicopter pilot, retiring as a Patrol Sergeant in 1986.

During this time, Diana was a stay-at-home Mom and, when her children were older, became very successful in selling real estate. She, too, retired with Gary in 1986, and it was off to the Olympic Peninsula to pursue an outdoor life of camping, fishing, and hunting!

Hallers and Smiths: Starting in Forks, Gary found "the perfect home" that met the couple's outdoor dreams;

but being isolated, 14 miles from the highway, Diana told him in no uncertain terms that "he could live there, but he'd have to visit her elsewhere." They decided they'd better get a book with more information about the Peninsula and work from there. Sequim looked promising, so they agreed, "Let's just buy a place there and see how it goes." What an auspicious decision *that* was!

The couple bought a piece of property on the Dungeness River from now-widowed Albert Haller, and had a house built there. With their mutual love of hunting and fishing, it wasn't long before Albert and Gary struck up a close friendship. As Albert's health deteriorated, Diana would assist him with doctor visits and medications. Gary would help Albert with home and yard work. When he went into assisted living, Albert agreed to sell his home to Gary and Diana.

Before Albert passed away in 1992, he set up a charitable foundation and asked Gary if he would be on the Board of Directors administering the funds. At the first meeting of the five-member Board, Gary was elected President, a position he has held to this day.

Albert Haller was the quintessential example of the rags-to-riches story! The tenth of 13 children, he attended the Dungeness School only until the fourth grade, when he was told by his father to get to work. He hung out at logging camps, prevalent on the Peninsula at the time, taking whatever jobs they would give him. Saving every penny he could, Albert was able to buy his own logging truck.

Starting with that one truck, he formed a successful logging company and began buying up land. Albert became the largest independent landowner in Clallam County. Turning to land development, he was "working on the Dungeness Heights development at the time of his death in 1992 at age 88."

The Albert Haller Foundation was based on Albert's generous spirit, developing a deep commitment to helping others in their community. The non-profit was founded "to be operated exclusively for charitable or educational purposes whose activities most closely correspond with my (Albert's) intention as to furthering the welfare of the citizens of Clallam County." This is divided into three categories: Education, Charitable Organizations, and Capital Projects. It gives several scholarships each year to Clallam County students, and supports organizations that feed and help the poor. Shipley Center's Building Fund has been the recipient of \$65,000 from the Foundation for renovating the JCPenney building, which will honor Albert's memory with the Haller Conference Room.

The need is always great. The Foundation is continually seeking additional funds to grow its principal so it can provide even more to the citizens of Clallam County in perpetuity.
