Spotlight on . . . Duane Cobb

As I was down to the newsletter deadline with no "Spotlight" to submit, I looked back over the many articles I had written about interesting Shipley members and employees, and found one about Duane Cobb from June, 2015. Although on our employee roster as *Maintenance* for ten years now, since Shipley Center started renovating the JCPenney building, Duane has been much more than that. He has been instrumental in leading a crew of volunteers and subcontractors in the demolition work in the interior, saving our Center tens of thousands of dollars!

Who is Duane Cobb, and why is he so involved with Shipley Center?

Recap from 2015:

Duane is a true native of Sequim . . . born and raised in Sequim, graduated from Sequim High School, and has lived here ever since!

When he was five, his Dad died suddenly in a car crash, leaving behind a wife and five children. Later, his Mom met Don Schmith, a rancher with four children of his own. After they married, Duane's Mom and her family joined Don on Palo Alto on his 40-acre farm. There, they had horses and raised cows, ducks, pigs, rabbits, and goats. His mom made sure they all learned to cook and clean; his step-dad taught them farm skills. They made sure the nine kids were always busy, from early morning hand-milking cows, churning their butter, caring for the livestock, and showing their animals in 4-H events.

Over the years, Duane has seen the farms and hay fields as they gave way to housing developments. He fondly recalls pitching hay at the buffalo farm on Evans Road where, at the age of 17, he built the barn. (You have to look hard for it, but it's still there!) At age 18, he started his own pressure-cleaning business.

He met his wife, Lenee, while working at the Chevron station in town. A Tacoma gal, Lenee was just passing through . . . and then passed through, again . . . and that was that! They raised two sons and a daughter, and fostered seven kids over the years in Sequim. They have four grandchildren. For twelve years, he was a contractor. For a time, he worked at a Port Townsend boatyard where he did almost everything—cutting, painting, welding, and even making chrome!

Duane loves coming to *Shipley Center*, happy to have the opportunity to put his building skills to use. He's a man who takes pride in doing a good job, making the Center look in top shape for its members. Some projects included cleaning the gutters, painting the building, and putting in a walkway by the stairs (no more gravel underfoot!).

Duane enjoys hunting, hiking, camping, and river fishing. Now that the kids are out of the house, he hopes to get back to those activities more often. He and Lenee would like someday to travel around the US, visiting some of our nation's National Parks.

Update to 2025

In chatting with Duane for this update, I found out that next month marks his **eleventh** year working for Shipley Center! I also found out that he has been instrumental in keeping Baywood Village (Shipley's 55+ mobile home park bequeathed by Leo Shipley to us) in such good shape over the years. He now does the mowing and weed-whacking for the complex, as well as whatever other jobs need to be done. He states confidently, "Baywood has never looked better!"

What would Shipley Center have done without Duane Cobb? During the eleven years, he has been instrumental in keeping the Center attractive and safe. He has done massive repair Continued on p.13

work on walls, stairs, and gutters. During the winter, it is Duane who is up early in the morning putting de-icer down around the Center's entrances so people do not slip. It was Duane who assembled the lovely patio area furniture in front of the building. Anyone for an outdoor lunch from Leo's Café?

But it is what is taking up much of Duane's time now that is of note: his work on what will be the NEW Shipley Center. The interior demolition at the former JCPenney building is about 95% done. The parking lot is in great shape. It is kept weeded, and homeless campers have moved on. It is being rented out to businesses (like RV sales) and offered to non-profits (like the SHS Choir Booster) for their fundraisers.

Duane is grateful to have a major role in the new center, something that has been needed for several years now. He leads a team of volunteers and works well with the subcontractors, assisting as he can. He says, "Having an experienced leader in Michael, and the

assisting as he can. He says, "Having an experienced leader in Michael, and the knowledge and experience of the volunteers, helps the project run smoothly."

Even after some eleven- and twelve-hour days, Duane says he "doesn't mind putting in the effort to make sure the community has an awesome building. The goal is to try to get it done as soon as possible so people can enjoy their new facility."

Ever the question: **When** will it be finished? Duane says, "When you've got a project of this size, it's dependent on so many factors: City permitting, sub-scheduling, and City inspections." Shipley has hired an Architect and a Mechanical Engineer to

help expedite the permitting process. They will try to ensure that there is nothing to cause the City to delay the issuing of the building permit. After permitting, new walls will be built, plumbing and electrical system put in, sheetrock, ceiling grids installed, and so much more!. Duane guestimates probably another 18-24 months. It's a long wait, but in the end, it will be well worth it to have the best center for Sequim's seniors for many years into the future.

Thank you, Duane, for all your work over the years with Shipley Center, not only keeping our old building and Baywood Village in tip-top shape, but now putting so much effort into making our new Shipley Center of tomorrow a reality! Know that you are greatly appreciated.

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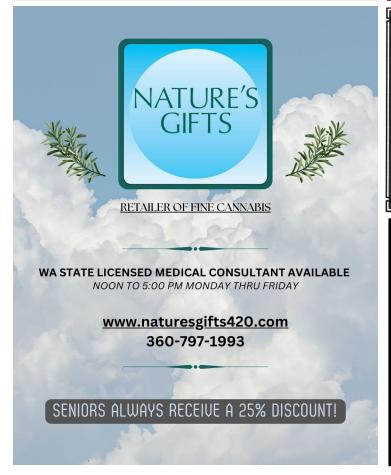


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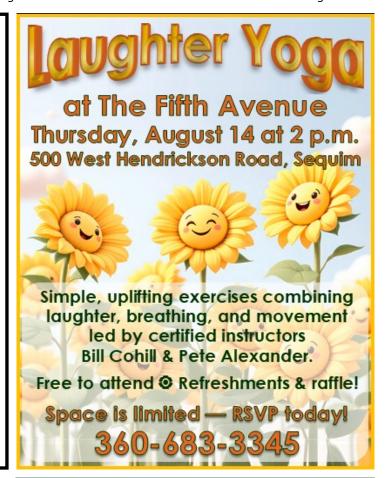

Beware: Airline Customer Service Scams Targeting Seniors

Scammers are increasingly targeting seniors by impersonating airline customer service representatives—often through fake phone numbers found in Google search results or social media ads. These schemes exploit trust and create a false sense of urgency during stressful travel situations.

How the Scam Works:

Seniors searching for airline help may unknowingly call fraudulent numbers listed through "malvertising"—ads that appear above real search results. Scammers posing as airline agents request personal or financial information, claiming it's needed for flight changes, cancellations, or refunds.

Red Flags to watch for:

Unfamiliar contact details: Always double-check numbers on the airline's official site.

Urgent requests for information: Legitimate agents won't ask for passwords or credit card info unsolicited.

Fake social media messages: Be wary of DMs from unverified airline accounts.

How to Protect Yourself:

Verify before calling: Use contact info only from official airline websites or apps.

Avoid sponsored ads: Don't click on paid listings in search engines.

Report scams: File complaints at ReportFraud.ftc.gov and notify the airline.

Scammers count on confusion and urgency. Stay calm, verify everything, and reach out through trusted channels.
