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Professional education requires proper training in appropriate standards of instruction (American Federation of Teachers, 1990). Institutions that offer these educational programs provide qualified college graduates to satisfy demands of the labor sector (Duncan, 1997). Colleges should train students to have related talents, passion, and determinations. These institutions should provide skill trainings, education, and practices that prepare students for certification, and employment in their respective fields.

Reports have demonstrated the sensitivity, delicate, and fastidious essentials of diverse professions, suggesting the need for college graduates to have adequate applicable knowledge. Notably, college graduates are entrusted with professional judgement(s), skills application, and assessment(s), that are true representation of their training.

Public higher institutions in Nigeria are good colleges, but in recent times public education has become a ridicule, disappointment to many, costly, and a scarce commodity. Studies show increase in student success when they receive support (Shann et al., 2012; Meli, 2015; Miller, 2008). Demonstrating that collegial support is one of the factors that influence student success

and retention in professional field (Duncan, 1997). Thus, it is possible that orphan and very poor children (OVC) may be able to further their scholastic career up to or beyond a college level in an affordable public higher institution.

The skyrocketing rate of youth illiteracy and school drop-outs in Nigeria, adds weight to the benefits of academic support required by college students. It is evident that private higher institutions tuition and admission requirements determined by political connections is not alleviating the suffering but impeding OVCs. Indicating that OVC academic preparedness for higher institutions in Nigeria is frustrated by skyrocket tuitions and/or lack educational support for prospective/ matriculating students. Their predicaments address the larger matter of higher institutions will address the larger matter of economic viability in Nigeria.

Finally, when it comes to the topic of college education in Nigeria, most of us will readily agree that the cost of higher education should be affordable. Where this agreement usually ends, however, is on the question of whether students can afford tuition fees in private /public higher institutions. Whereas some are convinced that costly private

higher institutions provide best quality education for students and prepares them to be successful in the professional field, others maintain that public higher institutions should be affordable and accessible for ALL students. By focusing on affordable and accessible education in Nigerian public higher institutions, we may be able to access the extent of support needed by OVCs in Nigeria.

It is Time Nigeria

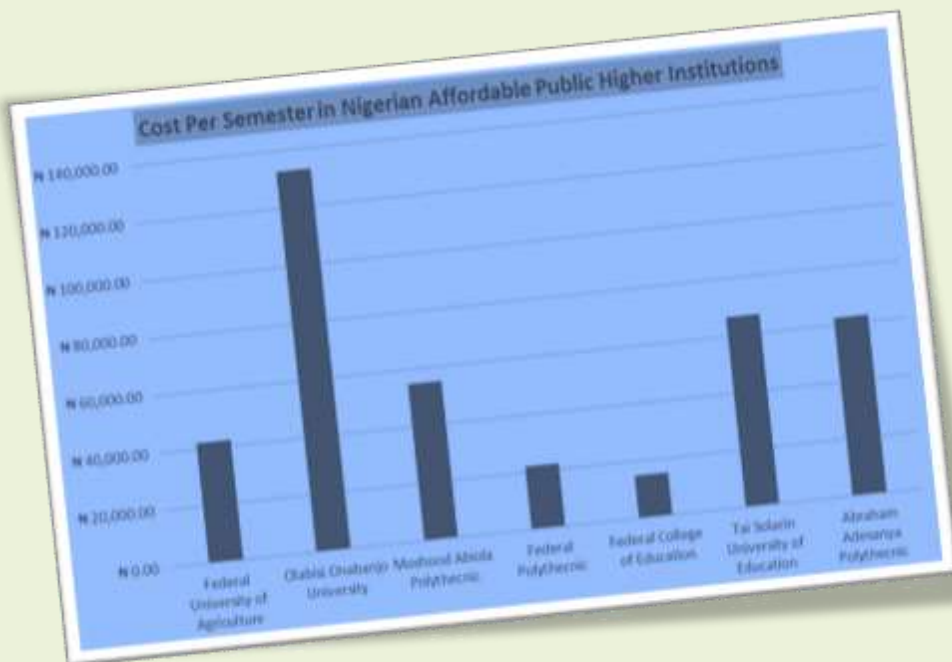
