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# CSEC TERMS TO KNOW

The Game/ The Life

The commercial sexual exploitation or the sex industry.

Track/Stroll/Blade

An area of town known for prostitution activity.

Circuit

A series of cities among which prostituted people are moved.

Dates/Johns/Tricks

Buyers of commercial sex.

Daddy

The term a pimp will often require his victim to call him.

Quota

A set amount of money that a trafficking victim must make each night before she can come "home."

Turn Out

To be forced into prostitution (verb) or a person newly involved in prostitution (noun).

Wifeys/Wife-in-law

What women and girls under the control of the same pimp call each other.

Bottom Bitch/Girl

A female appointed by the trafficker/pimp to supervise the others and report rule violations.

Stable

A group of women/girls under pimp control.

Branding

A tattoo or carving on a victim that indicates ownership by a trafficker/pimp/gang.

Kiddie Stroll

An area known for prostitution that features younger victims.

Breaking

To give all your money to your pimp.

Squad

Cops.

Square

Those who were never in "the life."

Squaring Up

To get out of the game.

# WARNING SIGNS OF CHILD SEX TRAFFICKING

## WARNING SIGNS THAT AN INDIVIDUAL IS BEING TRAFFICKED:

- Signs of physical abuse such as burn marks, bruises or cuts
- Unexplained absences from school, truancy
- Less appropriately dressed than before
- Sexualized behavior
- Overly tired or falls asleep in class
- Withdrawn, depressed, or distracted
- Brags about making or having lots of money
- Displays expensive clothes, accessories, or shoes
- New tattoo (tattoos are often used by pimps as a way to brand victims.)
- Older boyfriend, new friends with a different lifestyle, or gang involvement
- Disjointed family connections, running away, living with friends, or experiencing homelessness

## PIMPS/TRAFFICKERS OFTEN EXHIBIT THE FOLLOWING BEHAVIORS OR CHARACTERISTICS:

- Jealous, controlling and violent
- Significantly older than female companions
- Promise things that seem too good to be true
- Encourage victims to engage in illegal activities to achieve their goals and dreams
- Buys expensive gifts or owns expensive items
- Is vague about his/her profession
- Pushy or demanding about sex
- Encourages inappropriate sexual behavior
- Makes the victim feel responsible for his/her financial stability. Very open about financial matters.
